Setting (The physical environmentnatural or manmadeof a historic site. Describe the setting and how it has changed over time.): The setting is substantially different than what is seen in the Sanborn Insurance maps. Both the 1900 and 1907 maps show this structure as part of a larger structure that included a freight shed surrounded by platforms and rail lines. Of course, with the removal of the rail lines to accommodate residential and resort-related development, the depot remained as an important reminder of the transportation-related history. Currently, the structure stands alone in a large paved parking area surrounded by residential development and lacking any of the original context. The changes to the site and structure are significant and diminish the site's original design character.						
Workmanship (The physical evidence of the crafts of a particular culture or people during a given period in history. Describe the distinctive elements.): Much of the physical evidence from the period that defines the typical Park City mining era home has been altered and, therefore, lost.						
Feeling (Describe the property's historic character.): The physical elements of the site, in combination, do not effectively convey a sense of transportation-related activities in western mining town of the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries.						
Association (Describe the link between the important historic era or person and the property.): The structure is part of the collection of commercial and transportation-related structures from the early mining era in Park City; however, the extent of alterations to the structure diminishes its association with the past.						
The extent and cumulative effect of alterations to the site render it ineligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places. The site, however, retains its essential historical form and meets the criteria set forth in LMC Chapter 15-11 for designation as a Significant Site.

Park City was the center of one of the top three metal mining districts in the state during Utah's mining boom period of the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries, and it is one of only two major metal mining communities that have survived to the present. Park City's commercial and transportation-related buildings represent the best remaining metal mining town business district in the state. The buildings along Main Street, in particular, provide important documentation of the commercial character of mining towns of that period, including the range of building materials, building types, and architectural styles. They contribute to our understanding of a significant aspect of Park City's economic growth and architectural development as a mining business district<sup>2</sup>.
