NARRATIVE DESCRIPTION OF PROPERTY

664 Woodside is a T/L cottage that has undergone several modifications. The T/L cottage, also known as a cross-wing, is one of the main three house types built during the historic Park City mining era. The house was originally connected to a large livery building that was in turn connected to another house. The other structures have since been demolished, but this house remains. The cross gable roof is sheathed with standing seam metal. The walls are clad with bricktex siding, which likely covered the drop wood siding shown in the c. 1940 tax photo. A window with a central section flanked by two narrow sections, each of them multi-paned, sits in the front gable end of the house. A casement window sits to the right of the door in the porch area, but it is difficult to see and its type remains uncertain. There are two doors that enter the

house, one into the cross-wing and one into the stem wing, both appear to have an upper light. The porch wraps around the house from the primary façade to the south side, and is covered by a hip extension of the main roof. The porch roof is supported by square wood posts with a railing between. The house is below road grade and a stair leads down to it. A shed sits at the road level and is roofed with standing seam metal and clad with drop-novelty wood siding. The shed is noted on the 1949 tax card as a garage, but it is unknown when it was originally built. Although the overall form remains legible, the cumulative formal and material changes have diminished its historic value.

Narrative Statement of Significance:

The 1889 Sanborn map shows this property having a simple rectangular house, while the 1900 map shows the house as it appeared for the majority of the historic period. It is unknown whether the original structure was demolished or added onto. The house was likely built while the property was under the ownership of Caroline K. Snyder, who purchased it in 1882. Caroline was born in 1839 and lived in Park City with her twelve children. The 1880 census states that she was married, but no record of her husband was found. She lived until 1889, and the property transferred to her son Frank Snyder. Frank is noted as working on a farm in the 1880 census, and working as an electrician in the 1900 census. Frank owned the house with his wife Nina, until 1896.

The next owner was Edward Evans, a coal merchant who did not live in the house during the 1900 census, but lived in another house he owned on Norfolk Avenue. In 1901 the property was transferred to Zack Evans, Edward's brother. Zack was a teamster who did coal delivery, possibly somehow related to his brother's work as a coal merchant. In 1907 the house was sold to Frank Stewart.

No record of a Frank Stewart living in Park City exists, and it is likely that the house was rented out. The 1910 census shows that a house addressed 662 Woodside Avenue was rented by Annie Campbell and her two sons. As there is no house with that address found on the 1907 Sanborn map, it is likely that it is referring to this house. Annie did not work, but her sons Glen and Theodore worked as a plumber and a miner respectively. In 1914 the house was sold to Joseph Minetti. No records could be found regarding anyone of that name in the area. The house was next sold to Della Curtis Gray in 1917.

Della Gray is found on the 1920 census living on Woodside Avenue with her husband James. Della was born in Arizona, while James was born in Wyoming and worked in the mines. They moved to a house on the Tramway in 1922 and sold the house to George Erickson.

George Erickson worked in the mines, and lived in the house with his wife Thamszon and their two sons. He owned the house until it was transferred to his wife in 1943, though it is not known if this was due to his death or some other reason. The property stayed in the family for a time, but is currently owned by the Park City Redevelopment Agency.










Figure 1: Aerial view showing the location of 664 Woodside Avenue. (ESRI 2020)
