NARRATIVE DESCRIPTION OF PROPERTY

805 Woodside is a foursquare type house that has undergone minor changes. The foursquare type, also known as a pyramid house, is one of the main three house types built during the historic Park City mining era, and is the most recent of the three, occurring mostly at the end of that time period. A large rear addition has been built onto the house and alters the distinct pyramid roof shape with a short gable end visible above. The addition provides another entrance and a garage. The pyramid roof is sheathed with composition shingles and a large dormer protrudes toward the south façade. The walls are clad with narrow wood shiplap siding

which appears to be original and the concrete foundation can be seen below. The windows on the primary façade have a large central pane flanked by narrow panes, with two of these windows arranged symmetrically with the door between them. The door is obscured by the porch and its type is unknown, though it does appear to have a large upper lite. Unlike most houses in the area, the porch is uncovered, but partially enclosed by a half wall. A stair leads up to the porch parallel to the main street façade. The uncovered porch and stair appear to have been modified, no longer having the two corner piers. A small gable sits over the entry door. The site has a railroad tie retaining wall running parallel to Woodside Avenue. Although the form remains legible, the cumulative formal and material changes have diminished its historic value.

Narrative Statement of Significance:
(Briefly describe those characteristics by which this property may be considered historically significant.)

The first individual owner of this property was Jane Kidder. Nothing is known of Jane Kidder except that her husband George was a soldier in the Civil War. The property was sold to Charles Workman in 1926, and that is when it is assumed the original house was demolished and the present house was built.

Charles Workman was a blacksmith for the mines, who lived with his mother and sister on Norfolk Avenue. The 1930 census states that his mother was a boarder, and it is possible that this was one of the houses that they owned for that purpose. The house was not listed on the census that same year, indicating that it may have been vacant at that time. By the time of the 1940 census he was living in the house with his wife Teresa and their daughter. The title search states that he had transferred the property to his sister in 1933, but the census states that he owned the house. At some point the house came under the ownership of his sister Margaret Workman McPhie, owned the house with her husband for several years before selling it in 1943.

The property has changed owners several times since the historic period, and is currently owned by MDRP Holdings II LLC.








Figure 1: Aerial view showing the location of 805 Woodside Avenue. (ESRI 2020)


