NARRATIVE DESCRIPTION OF PROPERTY

(Briefly describe the property and its setting. The house at 817 Woodside Avenue was described in a National Register nomination form as follows:

"This house is a one story frame bungalow with a clipped gable roof. Built of drop siding, this house is a long rectangular form oriented gable end to the street. Characteristic of Park City bungalows is the low pitch of the roof, the clipped gable ends, and the small entrance hood supported on piers. The facade is symmetrical with a door centered between two horizontal window bays which are divided vertically into three parts by mullions. The shutters that frame the windows are not original. They are a recent addition, but one that is unobtrusive and easily reversible. The roof was extended on the south side to form a covered walkway down the side of the building. The alteration is minor, and does not affect the original character of the building. The wall of the

walkway was built of drop siding which complements the original house. Except for the walkway, the house has received no alterations. It is in excellent condition and maintains its original integrity."

The major change that has been made to this house since the time of this description is the porch modification. A stone retaining wall was added, likely at the same time. The fence shown in earlier photos was removed and the stair now leads directly to the sidewalk. Although the form remains legible, the cumulative formal and material changes have diminished its historic value.

This house was built sometime between 1900 and 1907. It is likely the owner of the property when the house was being built was William Elwood, as noted on the title search.

It is most likely that the William Elwood referred to in the title search is Heber William Elwood. Heber and his wife Emma were born in England and emigrated in 1878 and 1870 respectively. They lived on Park Avenue at the time of the 1900 census with their three children. William worked as a teamster. They purchased the property in 1901 and sold it in 1913 to Christina Palmer. The house did not appear on the 1910 census, indicating that it may have been vacant at that time.

The only Christina Palmer in the area lived in Salt Lake City with her husband Walter Palmer, and there is no record of her living in Park City. This is understandable as it may be possible that the house was not built yet. The next owner of the house was La Page Raddon.

La Page Raddon appears on the 1920 census, living in the house with his wife Maie. He worked as a linotype operator, and she worked as a school teacher. They continued to live at the house through the 1930 and 1940 census, at which time La Page worked as a printer. They retained the property until 1977. Since that time the house has had several owners, and is currently owned by Wysteria and Peg Bodell.










Figure 1: Aerial view showing the location of 817 Woodside Avenue. (ESRI 2020)
