NARRATIVE DESCRIPTION OF PROPERTY

823 Woodside is a T/L cottage house that has had significant changes made to it over time. The T/L cottage, also known as a cross-wing is one of the main three house types built during the historic mining era. A small shed extension on the south side of the house was previously a covered porch that was enclosed sometime after the c. 1940 photo. The cross gable roof used to be sheathed with standing seam metal, which replaced the shingle material shown in the c. 1940 tax photo. It is now covered with asphalt shingles. The walls are clad with drop-novelty wood siding. The large sliding window in the front gable end replaced two one-overone double hung sash windows shown in the early photo sometime after 1940s but it restored to the original shape between 2013 and 2020. The window in the porch area also has been restored to its original shape as well. The windows used to have a decorative trim, with a pediment over the window in the gable end, which

was not original to the house. The door is a wood frame and panel door with an upper light. The porch is covered by a shed extension of the main roof. Another major change to the house is the new parking which is created by raising the house and the stairway that provide the access to the house through the porch on the south east corner.

Narrative Statement of Significance:
(Briefly describe those characteristics by which this property may be considered historically significant.)

This house was built before the 1889 Sanborn map was drawn, possibly while the land was under the ownership of the Park City Townsite Corporation. George Tait acquired the land that the house is on in 1887, and it is also possible that the house was built while under his ownership. He worked as a carpenter, and moved to Butte shortly after selling the house to Frederick Rasband in 1889.

Frederick Rasband was the first bishop in the Park City area, and also worked in a butcher store during the 1920 census, but not much else is known about him. It is unknown if he ever lived at the property, but he does not appear on any of the censuses that occurred during the time he owned the house. An addition to the rear of the house was built while he was the owner. He sold it to George and Mary Smith in 1909. George worked as a butcher at that time, though previous records state he was a provision dealer. They were living in the house during the 1910 census with their five children. They sold the house back to Frederick Rasband in 1913, and he sold it in 1914 to William Lewis.

William Lewis lived in the house with his wife Ethel and four children during the 1920 census. He worked as a coal merchant at that time; no other information could be found on him or his family. He sold the house in 1928 to Don Petersen.

It appears that Don Petersen did not live in the house but rented it out from that time forward. In 1930 the house was rented by Byron Jones and his family. Byron worked as a music teacher for the local school. He was highly involved with the orchestra in the city and helped with the music aspect of many events. The house was rented by Clarence and Hazel Nichols at the time of the 1940 census. Clarence was an assayer with a mine, and they lived at the home with a son and a daughter.

The house was owned by Peteresen until 1961, and has changed hands many times since then, being currently owned by 823 Woodside LLC.







Figure 1: Aerial view showing the location of 823 Woodside Avenue. (ESRI 2020)
