NARRATIVE DESCRIPTION OF PROPERTY

1053 Woodside is a T/L cottage that has been reconstructed with an addition on the rear. The T/L cottage, also known as a cross-wing, is one of the main three house types built during the historic Park City mining era. The addition is taller than the original house and expands back to the rear of the lot. The cross gable roof is sheathed with composition shingles, as is the roof of the addition. The walls are clad with drop-novelty wood siding and the front gable is clad with fishscale shingles. The windows on the front façade are only partially accurate in their reconstruction. The one-over-one windows in the projecting bay are correct, with one window on each side, and two in the front. The projecting bay itself appears to be a reconstruction. However, the pair of one-over-one double hung sash windows in the porch area has been modified, as the c. 1940 tax photo shows there being a single larger window there. The door is a wood frame and panel door

with an upper light. The porch follows along the side of the house and is covered by a hipped roof. The porch roof is supported by square posts that are topped with decorative brackets. There is a garage on the site at the rear of the lot which was present in the 1940 tax photo. The garage is clad with drop novelty siding, but its roof material is not known. The site has a stone retaining wall recessed from the sidewalk; this element was not present until the reconstruction. Given that this house is a reconstruction, and the large additions, the historic value of the house has been diminished.

This house was built before the 1900 census, likely while the property was under the ownership of Charles and Mary Svenson. There is a Charles Svenson that was in the hospital in Park City at the time of the 1900, but it is unknown if this is the same individual. There are no records of a Mary Svenson living in Park City, and it is assumed that they rented out the house at this time. They sold the house to Nannie Burns in 1910.

James and Nannie Burns lived in the neighboring house, 1045 Woodside Avenue, during the 1910 census. That census states that the house was occupied by Willard Brimshaw and his wife Mary at that time, and also states that they owned the house, though their names do not appear anywhere in the title history. Willard Brimshaw was a painter, but nothing else is known of him. James Burns worked as a bartender; the Burns sold the house in 1916 to Lettie May Lenzi.

Lettie Lenzi appears on the 1920 census, living at the house with her husband Roy and their four children. Roy worked as a house painter, but nothing else is known of their family. They sold the house in 1924 to W.B. Wilson.

No information could be found on a W.B. Wilson living in Park City; the house was sold to LaFayette Anderson in 1929. LaFayette lived on Main Street with his wife Rhoda during the 1930 census. He worked as an attorney for the county. They rented this house out, and during the 1930 census it was occupied by William Reseigh, his wife, Jessie, and their four children. William worked as a miner, and one of his sons later became mayor of Park City.

It appears that the property was foreclosed on by 1943, and was finally purchased in 1948. It is currently owned by Genevieve Marie Rosol.





Figure 1: Aerial view showing the location of 1053 Woodside Avenue. (ESRI 2020)


