NARRATIVE DESCRIPTION OF PROPERTY

1107 Woodside is a bungalow type house that has recently had a large rear addition built. While the bungalow is not one of the main three house types built during the historic Park City mining era, it was still common during that time period. The rear addition was built after 1995 and is visible from the front of the house. The hipped roof of the original house is sheathed with composition shingles, as is the roof of the addition. The walls are clad with wood drop-novelty siding, though past images show that there were instances of aluminum and board and batten siding on the house at certain times, though this may have

simply covered the original material. There is also board-and-batten skirting currently covering the area below the porch similar to its original condition, though past images show that it was previously clad in a stone veneer and what appears to be a corrugated metal before that. The windows on the primary façade are both groups of a large central pane flanked by two narrow panes. One of these groups is present in the porch area to the right of the door and the other is left of the door where the wall is recessed farther from the street. The door is a wood frame and panel door with a large multi-pane upper light. The porch area is covered by an extension of the roof that is supported by thick square columns that taper toward the top which replicate the original and replace the non-historic metal supports. A simple wood railing surrounds the porch. The restoration restored key elements and the overall form of the original house remains intact. Despite the rear addition, the overall form and materiality of the building remains intact and the building retains its historic value.

Narrative Statement of Significance:

This house was built between 1889 and 1900, judging from when it appeared on the Sanborn Insurance maps. It was constructed under the ownership of either the Park City Townsite Corporation or the first individual to own the house, Duncan McCornick. No information could be found on Duncan McCornick, but he sold the house in 1900 to Martha Voigt.

Martha Voigt does not appear on any of the censuses of Park City, but she died there and is buried in the city cemetery. Not much information is available on her, except that she sold the house to A F Redding in 1906. While the property was owned by either Voigt or Redding, a small addition was built onto the rear of the house.

Arthur Redding appears on the 1910 census living in this house with his wife Eva and their three children. Arthur was a machinist who worked for a mine. No other information could be found on him or his family. At some point the property came under the ownership of the county, possibly through a tax sale, and was purchased in 1930 by Flossie Miles.

Flossie Miles lived in this house at the time of the 1930 census with her husband Dell and their daughter Donna. Dell worked in the mining industry, and was a veteran on WWI. It appears that they began renting the

house out at some point, as it was occupied by Joe Welson and his family during the 1940 census. Joe worked for a mining company as a top cager. They sold the house in 1943 to Carl Louder. The house has had several owners since that time and is currently owned by Hugh Gallagher.








Figure 1: Aerial view showing the location of 1107 Woodside Avenue. (ESRI 2020)

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
