NARRATIVE DESCRIPTION OF PROPERTY

(Briefly describe the property and its setting. 698 Park is a rectangular house that has not undergone any major additions, which has preserved its original form and design. The rectangular house is sometimes more associated with pyramid house types in this area; however, this instance is actually more similar to a hall-parlor in plan and roof type. The hall-parlor is one of the main three house types to be built during the historic Park City mining era. The side gable roof is sheathed with composition shingles, as is the hipped roof covering the porch. It is clad with wood drop-novelty siding. The windows all appear to be two-over-two double hung sash types placed symmetrically on the facades. Two doors with large upper lights are present on the primary façade of the building, also placed symmetrically. The porch roof is supported by lathe turned posts with decorative brackets. A simple wood railing stretches between the piers. It appears that either the road grade was lowered, or the house was lifted between c. 1940 and 1995, given more of the foundation and

area below the porch is visible at present. The house is currently used for commercial purposes. The overall form and materiality of the building remains intact and the building retains its historic value.

Narrative Statement of Significance:

This house was built around 1885, most likely as an investment property for Edwin Kimball. The neighboring building, 690 Park Avenue, was built at the same time and for the same purpose, and is almost identical to this building. The 1984 National Register nomination form for that building gives this information on Edwin Kimball:

"Edwin Kimball, a native of Massachusetts, had come to Utah in 1865 and had been associated with Park City since its early mining camp days of the early 1870s. His primary occupation was operating a mine supplies business, but he also had extensive real estate holdings and investments in other enterprises which brought him much financial success. Edwin Kimball served as mayor of Park City for a time. In the mid-1880s, however, he moved to Salt Lake City where he built a fine, large house at 125 South 600 East. He died in 1893."

After his death, the affairs of his companies, including this property, were managed by his wife, Geneva Kimball. This property was owned by the Kimball Investment Company until 1917, when it was sold to Alexander Gardner.

Alexander Gardner appears on the 1920 census, living in a house on Park Avenue, though the address is not given, so it is unknown if it is this house. He lived there with his wife Etta and their three children. He worked as a car inspector for the railroad, and was later an official photographer for the Union Pacific Railroad Company. He sold the house in 1921 to Frank Knotts.

Frank and Hattie Knotts only owned this house for a year, and it is unknown if they ever lived in this house. Frank worked in the motion picture industry, and was the manager of the Orpheum Theatre. They sold the house in 1922 to Ezra Workman.

Ezra Workman lived in this house at the time of the 1930 census, with his wife Mamie and their son Grant, and several boarders. He worked as a fireman for a mine, and was also deputy county assessor for a time. They still lived in this house at the time of the 1940 census, though his son had moved out by then. Ezra died in 1950, but the house stayed in his family until 1954. It is currently owned by Mahoney Enterprises LP.





698 Park Avenue. West elevation. November 2013.





Final Rites Honor Ezra Workman

Last Sunday at the L. D. S. First ward church at 2 p.m., funeral services were conducted for Ezra Workman, long time resident of this city, by Bishop William Durrant of the Second ward. Speakers were Joseph E. Wells, Zach Obiad and Dr. Ezra Waddoups, all of Salt Lake City. Invocation was by Bishop Noel Despain of the First ward. Lloyd Stanley, second counsellor to Bishop Durrant, offered the benediction.

Favorite funeral songs were beautifully rendered by Mr. and Mrs. Bay Moss and Mrs. Vanza Eurnham of Sait Lake City and Mrs. Vella Sachett of Brigham. Next door neighbor, and a friend of many years, Mrs. Blanche Fistcher, did all accompanying on the piano for the singers and played both prelude and postlude numbers. Dr. Waddoups dedicated the final resting place at City cemetery.

Because funerals for other members of her family had been conducted at the First ward. Mrs. Workman asked and was granted the privilege of having the funeral held there, although the Work-

mans were members of the Second ward,
Mr. Workman, son of Hyram and
Marinda Merrill Workman, was born at
Farmington, Davis county, Utah. The
family moved to Snyderville for a few
years and then came on to Park City
where Ezra had since resided.

By working at mining, laboring at the Judge and Silver King, he became more and more interested in it until the roots of his life were deeply established in the soil of this locality. For three years he served as deputy county assessor.

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He married Mamie Gibbons of Rockport, this county, and to this couple
five children were born. Hildred, Vern
and Grace preceded their father in
death.

Surviving him are his widow, two sons, Clifford Workman of Salt Lake City: Grant Workman of Los Angeles, California; a grandson, Calvin Workman, son of Clifford, and two sisters, Mrs. Josie Hauder of Los Angeles, and Mrs. Ruth Barben of West Jordan, Utah.

The fine friendship and kindness of the Ezra Workman family was attested to by the great number who attended the funeral. His was a kind heart and he was ever ready to help one of his fellows.
