### NARRATIVE DESCRIPTION OF PROPERTY

1129 Park is a hall-parlor type house undergone minor changes. The hall-parlor is one of the main three house types built during the historic Park City mining era, and was the earliest of those three, usually occurring towards the beginning of that time period. The side gable roof is sheathed with standing seam metal, which replaced the aluminum material mentioned on the tax cards. A gabled porch extends from the center of the roof; this element was not present in the c. 1940 tax photo and does not appear on any Sanborn maps up to 1941. The house is clad with drop-novelty wood siding. The windows on the front façade were originally two six-over-six double hung sash windows arranged symmetrically with the door in the center are present as shown on the c. 1940 tax photo, but are currently aluminum picture windows, with the window on the left being wider than the nearly square window on the right. The door is an out of period wood door with several lites, and has a metal screen door in front of it. The foundation is not visible and its material is unknown. The lot is very narrow, with the house touching its neighbor to the left. Although the form remains legible, the cumulative formal and material changes have diminished its historic value.

Narrative Statement of Significance:

This house appears on the 1889 Sanborn Insurance map, which was the first map for this area, which makes it difficult to determine an exact year of construction. The property was owned by the Park City Townsite Corporation at that time, and may have been used to house workers until it was purchased by Jens Rasmussen in 1890.

Jens Rasmussen appears on the 1900 census for Parley's Park, Utah, which is north of Park City. He lived there with his wife Christina and their eight children. He and his family moved from Denmark to Park City in 1890. It is unknown if he and his family ever lived in this house, but it is possible that this was their first home after their immigration to the U.S. They sold this house in 1909 to Isaac Sundstrom.

Isaac Sundstrom appears on the 1910 census, living in this house with his wife Erika and their three sons. The census lists him as a laborer that did odd jobs, and Erika worked as a dressmaker. They were both born in Sweden, with Isaac immigrating to the U.S. in 1883, and Erika in 1893. In 1929 the property went up for a tax sale but was redeemed by Isaac and Erika's son Albert. The house does not appear on the 1930 census, indicating that it was vacant at that time, but was occupied by Albert and his wife Mable, and their three children at the time of the 1940 census. Albert worked as a motorman for a mining company. The property stayed in the Sundstrom family until 2012, when it was sold to the current owner, Patricia Welch.













1129 Park Avenue. Northeast oblique. November 2013.

# Jens Peter Rasmussen Dies in Gorgoza

At his home in Gogorza last Tuesday, Jens Peter Rasmussen died from heart failure. The sufferer had been alling for a year or more, and had been confined to his bed for three weeks.

Mr. Rasmussen was born in Denmark on October 12th, 1858. He came to Utah in 1889, making his home at Gorgorza the far greater portion of the time since then. He was a kindly, industrious citizen, being held in high esteem by all who knew him, and to his widow and children sympathy is extended in their bereavement.

Deceased is survived by his widow Mrs. Christina Marie Rasmussen, and eight children, Christina R., Mrs. Marie Roach, Erastus L., James R., Aaron K., Osmer and Osmund, all living in Parley's Park, and Orson Rasmussen of Oakland, California, Also one sister, Mrs. Andrea McLaughlin, of Salt Lake

Short funeral services will be held at Gogorza Sunday at 10 o'clock. Remains will be taken to Salt Lake for burial, services being held in the Twenty-fifth ward meeting house at 2 o'clock, p. m.

## Mrs. Sundstrom Dies

Last Sunday morning, at the family residence on lower Woodside avenue, Mrs. Erika Johnson Sundstrom, closed her eyes in death, and entered eternal sleep, shortly before the noon-day hour, October 27th. The lady had been afflicted with bronchitis; heart trouble followed and for about two months has been affing, getting gradually weaker until the Resper claimed her. Born in Tempt, Sweden, September 15, 1861, she had passed the three-score and eight milestone in life's journey. Coming to America in

1882, she lived in Murray until 1904 when she arrived in Park City and has been a respected ritizen in this chosen arction for a quarter of a century. She was a member of the L. D. S. church, and Wednesday last, services were held at 11 o'clock, conducted by Bishop Oblad, and were attended by many friends and neighbors. 


